Subject: Geographic Split of 314 (Missouri) Numbering Plan Area (NPA)

---

Southwestern Bell has advised NANPA that substantial number growth in the Missouri 314 NPA necessitates providing area code relief. The relief plan, approved by the Missouri Public Service Commission, calls for a geographic split of the 314 NPA and the simultaneous introduction of a new 636 NPA. The following is a description of this relief plan.

The exchanges of Chestnut, Jefferson, Prospect, Flanders, Forest, Mission, Melrose, Webster Groves, Parkview, Evergreen, Riverview, Ferguson, Overland, Ladue, Kirkwood, Sappington, Mehlville, Oakville, Creve Coeur, Bridgeton, Hazelwood, Florissant, and Spanish Lake will retain the 314 NPA. All other exchanges currently in the 314 NPA will move to the new 636 NPA.

The split of the 314 NPA, and the beginning of a permissive dialing period, will take place at 12:01 AM Central Daylight Time (CDT) on Saturday, May 22, 1999. The permissive dialing period will end at 12:01 AM Central Standard Time (CST) on Saturday, February 26, 2000. During the permissive dialing period, either 314 or 636 NPA code will be acceptable in a dialed number terminating in the new 636 NPA. After the permissive period, all calls dialed with the incorrect NPA code will be routed to intercept.

The attached [map](#) illustrates the 314 and 636 NPA configuration after the split. Also attached are listings provided by Southwestern Bell of the assigned central office codes (NXXs) in the 314 and 636 NPAs after the split. The NXX information is effective as of January 14, 1999. Since NXX information may change over time, updated NXX information may be found either in the Local Exchange Routing Guide (LERG) or the NPA NXX Activity Guide (NNAG). Current information in the LERG and NNAG is available by license contract from Bellcore's Traffic Routing Administration (TRA) group, which can be contacted by dialing the TRA Hotline at 732-699-6700.

All international and domestic carriers should ensure that the new 636 NPA has been activated throughout their networks prior to May 22, 1999. Test calls to verify routing to the 636 NPA can be made by dialing the following test number, effective May 14, 1999: 636-267-1111. A recorded announcement will indicate that the test call has been successfully completed. The test number will be disconnected at the end of permissive dialing on February 26, 2000.

The dialing plan for the 314 and 636 NPAs will be as follows:

- All home NPA (HNPA) local calls will be dialed on a 7-digit basis with no prefix -- i.e. NXX+XXXX (7 digits)
- All HNPA toll calls, i.e., calls that generally incur an extra charge, will require a prefix "1" and 10 digits -- i.e., 1+HNPA+NXX+XXXX (10 digits)
- All foreign NPA (FNPA) local calls will be dialed on a 10-digit basis with no prefix -- i.e., FNPA+NXX+XXXX (10 digits)
- All FNPA toll calls will be dialed with a prefix "1" and 10 digits -- i.e., 1+FNPA+NXX+XXXX (1 + 10 digits)
- All operator assisted calls, including credit card, collect, and third party calls, will be dialed with a "0" prefix and 10 digits -- i.e., 0+NPA+NXX+XXXX (0 + 10 digits)
